Forty years of monkey business

Jane Goodall brings her work to Fair Park in IMAX film

Jane Goodall is a legend in her own time, and deservedly so.

Now you can see the story of her life's work — and the chimpanzees that she has helped make famous — in a new giant-screen film, opening Saturday at the Science Place TI Founders IMAX Theater in Fair Park.

Dr. Goodall will appear at two gala Fair Park events Saturday, but if you don't already have your \$250 tickets, you shouldn't plan to attend. They are sold out.

The good news, however, is that her movie, *Wild Chimpanzees*, will

have public showings starting Sunday.

The IMAX film, directed by Dave Lickley, tracks Dr. Goodall's more than 40 years of work with the chimpanzees of the Gombe Stream National Park in Tanzania. For the first time, viewers will get to see giant-screen images of such now-famous chimps as Fifi, who first walked up to Dr. Goodall in 1960, and Frodo, Fifi's now-grown son who rules the Gombe clan.

Even more interesting for the children will be the arrivals of rare twins Golden and Glitter — and the attention-grabbing behavior of a showoff named Titan.

The film, which also uses archival footage of Dr. Goodall's early days in Gombe, is a co-production

of the Science Museum of Minnesota, Science North and Discovery Place Inc.
